"Why must property tax reform come at the expense of appropriate special education for our special children?"

Pennsylvania's state budget still has not been approved by our elected leadership in Harrisburg. The last attempt to do so involved a backdoor piece of legislation introduced by State Senator David Argall in late November, Senate Bill 76. If passed, it would have destroyed the State Act I Special Education exemption, which enables school districts to quickly obtain funds in order to accommodate fluctuations in special education costs. This would have caused permanent harm to appropriate special education for our special children.

Thanks to twenty-four of our Senators and our Lieutenant Governor, Senate Bill 76 was <u>defeated</u> - <u>this</u> <u>time</u>. But Senator Argall has vowed to still fight to get it through, so that he and his uninformed colleagues can say they have passed the budget <u>and</u> eliminated property taxes in Pennsylvania. Sad fact of the matter is that in his rush to get it to the floor, Senator Argall did not take the time to submit it to the independent fiscal office or any accounting expert to see if its passage would work as promised - that is, if it would actually raise enough in taxes to eliminate the state property tax.

Rumor has it that Senate Bill 76 and similar property tax legislation might be "off the table". Nevertheless, the entire autism community is urged to telephone or write their State Senators and Representatives to ensure that it's no longer being on the table doesn't mean it lands on the floor...
